Literacy, Literature, and Technology:

How Technology May or May Not Ignite, Delight, and Cultivate Lifetime Literacy Across the Curriculum Susannah Richards

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Teaching is about asking: What do students need to know?, What do they already know?, and What are the ways they might acquire content, skills, and/or strategies to learn what they need to know? Specifically, students need to be literate in order to navigate the world as listeners, speakers, readers, and writers. As you plan how to ignite, delight, and cultivate literacy, consider how technology that might help you and/or your students to meet and/or exceed the objectives.

The goal is to use skills and strategies that may increase and/or streamline teaching and learning. The goal is not to see the technology as the destination. The following is a list of books that I adore, at this moment, under these circumstances, for sharing with readers and teachers. I believe that technologies would supplement students' learning as they read, comprehend, and respond to any of these texts. I include a basic example of this approach for 101 Ways to Read a Book. I share a few suggestions for types of technologies to support literacy after the table of books. In the session, I share Dear Clueless: The Rejection Letters of Edna Albertson (https://www.hbook.com/story/dear-clueless-rejection-letters-edna-albertson) as an example of how literacy, technology, and comprehension might combine. Why not have students write their own rejection letters as if they were an editor receiving a submission for a book?
